Course Description

Beginning with the emergence of human communities, this course walks students through ancient civilizations and into the rise of Western society. Students will explore the ancient civilizations of Egypt, Rome, and Greece before learning about the Islamic world, Byzantium, the Renaissance, and the Scientific Revolution. Western Civilization I is a broad overview of key events and people that shaped the course of Western society. Students will explore these topics through readings, videos, and direct engagement with primary sources.

Learning Outcomes

After completing this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Identify key moments in the development of Western society.
- 2. Describe the social, economic, and political impact that the discovery of the New World had on Europe.
- 3. Analyze original historical materials.
- 4. Interpret primary sources within their appropriate historical context.
- 5. Organize historical events into chronological order.
- 6. Justify your thinking with well-organized and well-supported thoughts.
- 7. Compare and contrast early Western societies.
- Examine the secularization of religious authority to develop a deeper understanding of the political underpinnings of the Medieval world.
- 9. Explain the rise and fall of the ancient Greek, Roman, and Egyptian civilizations.
- 10. Identify and explain the social and political impact of the Scientific Revolution.
