Course Description

Beginning with the Scientific Revolution, this course walks students through major developments of the early modern era to the present, including various revolutions, moments of key reform, and global wars. Western Civilization II is a broad overview of key events, people, and ideas that shaped Western society as we know it today. Students will explore these topics through readings, videos, and direct engagement with primary sources.

Learning Outcomes

After completing this course, you will be able to:

- 1. Identify key moments in the development of Western society since the Scientific Revolution.
- 2. Describe the social, economic, and political impact of the Enlightenment on society and science.
- 3. Analyze original historical materials.
- 4. Interpret primary sources within their appropriate historical context.
- 5. Organize historical events into chronological order.
- 6. Justify your thinking with well-organized and well-supported thoughts.
- 7. Compare and contrast early modern Western societies.
- 8. Examine the secularization of religious authority to develop a deeper understanding of the political underpinnings of the Renaissance and Enlightenment eras.
- 9. Explain how fascism impacted society and politics in the 20th and 21st centuries.
- 10. Consider how historical events shaped our current moment.

While there are no prerequisites to take Western Civilization II, it is recommended that students complete Western Civilization I before enrolling in Western Civilization II.
